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Dear Parents/Carers

Thank you all for taking the time to fill out the questionnaires that we sent home last term. In total we had 43. We had some amazing responses which included:

- Brading School is an excellent school, the staff are very understanding and child focused.
- The school has high expectations and works hard in a fun way to achieve this. I couldn't be happier with how much my child has learnt and how eager he is to learn. Fab hardworking team.
- The staff work as a wonderful team, make parents feel welcome and valued in the child's development journey. Our children have improved in terms of behaviour and ability to work with realistic but challenging goals. Its lovely for the children to be a part of a school community where they can thrive.
- Can't thank the school enough for all they have done to help integrate our son back into a school environment after a previous school setting left him highly distressed.
- Couldn't be happier with the way my child has progressed since being at this school.
- The standards are very high with regards to learning in reception class and there seems to be good, strong staff leading the class. The level my child is working at is already higher than we expected and is reading lots of words. When my child started they weren't aware of any letters or words, we are still so shocked but mega pleased with the progress. Office staff are very friendly and helpful when we've had to liaise messages and know my child well, greeting by name. Senco, family liaison officer and headteacher too are very friendly and take on board our concerns regarding what to do e.g. attendance.
- Children learn well and enjoy school. My child loves everything about school and we couldn't be happier with their progress and how school is helping them grow as a person.
- After a period of time out of school, my child has thrived since joining Brading school. My child is happy, confident, very well-supported and proud to be a member of the school community.
- Brading is an amazing school. My child has progressed so much with the help of all the staff. They treat each child as an individual and their needs. I couldn't recommend enough!

Thank you for also taking the time to raise some of your concerns with us which we are extremely pleased to address:

- 1. Nit situation We will arrange for the school nurse to come in and undertake a session which will be available to all parents and carers to support. We are not allowed to check children's hair, but we can continue to give advice and support. We will also put additional information in our newsletter and Mrs Willshire, our family liaison officer, is always available to discuss/support with this. We cannot get rid of them as they have been around for thousands of years but we are here to support you.
- 2. Parking & Lollipop person We are working with our local counsellor Cllr Brian Tyndall, who is also an Associate Governor, to see what else we can do to support. Mr Earley and Miss Larner are there daily to keep everyone safe in the school grounds, but we all have a duty of care to do this. This is on our newsletter weekly.
- 3. Behaviour in the classroom and during the school day All incidents are acted upon and as stated in our current February Ofsted – Learning activities are rarely affected by poor behaviour, so that all pupils can enjoy learning! Pupils themselves celebrate the differences positively. One pupil said "Brading wouldn't be the same without all the different kinds of children."
- 4. Appropriate age desks chairs All of our chairs and tables are either for KS1 or KS2 and have been bought specifically for each class. We are more than happy to see how else we can support children's sensory needs in regards to being comfortable and ready to learn. If you would like to come in and make an appointment to see Miss Matson, this can be easily arranged.
- 5. After school club for working parents If anyone needs wrap around support please contact the school office, as we can currently provide you numbers of local child minders who are able to support in this area.
- 6. School trips to the mainland Year 6 children take part annually with this, but we are going over our curriculum and this is a further probability it can be extended across all years. To achieve this, we would also need to increase the parental contribution.
- 7. Bullying We do not tolerate bullying at all. As a headteacher I will always ensure that everything is investigated. In our recent Ofsted report from February, it states 'Pupils are happy and feel safe' and they say there is always someone to listen to them if they are worried. Pupils trust the staff so that bullying does occur they are confident that it will be dealt with swiftly. If you do have any concerns please come and speak to me straight away, I am always happy to help.
- 8. Changes of teachers Staff changes are always very difficult. With all the changes I have made as headteacher, I always think about the needs of the children and which options are the least disruptive to them. If anyone wishes to discuss this further, my door is always open.

- 9. Academic results on the website In our recent Ofsted it states that leaders have maintained a good standard of education since the previous inspection, leaders and teachers are ambitious for all pupils. My door is open and I am happy to discuss results with you in more detail.
- 10. Classrooms being too small The exciting news is our extension and alterations will definitely start in April this year which means we will have more space. A meeting will be arranged nearer the start date so you can see what the changes will be.
- 11. Water based paints We will always ensure that when children are taking part in painting activities that they wear an apron/cover. However sometimes things come through. We do buy paints that should come out of clothes. I am more than happy for any child to have a top in school they use just for painting. Please let class teachers know is this is what you wish to happen and you are able to provide an appropriate top.
- 12. Examples of work Homework is planned as an extension of what is happening in class. Parents/carers are welcome weekly on a Wednesday to come in 3-3:15pm to have a look at books and ask any questions. Teaching staff are available to assist. Please see class teachers to make an appointment.

The other area we asked you was in regards to reading. Our recent Ofsted states 'Reading is well taught in the school'. One of the areas parents/carers have asked for is for children to be heard reading more frequently as well as changing books. To achieve this, we need more volunteer helpers daily. If you would like to help, please see the office staff.

How likely are you to catch the virus?

- you can only catch it if you have been close to a person who has the virus
- the chance of being in contact with the virus is currently low in the UK
- If you have travelled to areas where many people are infected, your chance of catching the virus is higher, i.e. China and any affected areas
